Term 1 - Curriculum Overview

English Writing a Narrative	Maths
In this unit, students read and view a range of humorous stories including 'The World's Worst Children' by David Walliams. They will comprehend the main idea and messages of narratives. Students will create a narrative.	□ Number and place value□ Chance□ Measurement
Year 3 Narrative Writing: Examining imaginative texts by exploring text structure, language choices and visual features used to suit context, purpose and audience.	Year 3 students will be assessed on representing, adding and subtracting numbers and conducting a simple chance experiment.
Year 4 Narrative Writing: Investigating author's language in a familiar narrative by examining and analysing the language features and techniques used by the author.	Year 4 students will be assessed on using the properties of odd and even numbers and identifying and explaining chance events.
Science Beneath our feet	Humanities & Social Sciences (HASS)
We live in a world that is constantly changing. Even things that might be considered immovable such as mountains or rocks are gradually changing. In this unit, students will create miniature landscapes to explore the impacts of natural processes and human activity. Year 3 and Year 4 will be assessed separately using achievement standards for their level of learning.	Year 3: Our unique communities: Students will conduct an inquiry about our connection to special days throughout the year. Year 4: Connection to country: Students will research and investigate the experiences of European explorers, convicts, settlers and Australia's First Peoples, and the impact colonisation had on the lives of different groups of people.
